

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

The Mary Meuser Memorial Library came to the people of Wilson Borough and the communities of the Wilson Area School District through the generosity of Frederick H. Meuser (1868-1960). This early land developer was also very active in community affairs. The Library is named in memory of his wife, Mary (1877-1957); her oil paintings are displayed in the Library. The Meuser home, which was considered a mansion at the time of its construction in 1924, was opened as a public library on October 15, 1962.



New Open Burning Ordinance

In accordance with the 2010 decennial census, Williams Township's population now exceeds the minimum thresholds contained in the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (Act 101), passed by the General Assembly in 1988, and is obligated by law to implement an ordinance to regulate open outdoor burning.



On September 11, 2013, the Board of Supervisors passed Ordinance 2013-6 which provides for the regulation of open outdoor burning, prescribing penalties and remedies for violation thereof, and repealing all prior inconsistent burning ordinances, specifically repealing Ordinance 1992-7. Therefore, effective Monday, September 16th, the Township will no longer provide burning permits. Residents are no longer permitted to burn leaves, yard waste and recyclable materials. For a complete list of items that cannot be burned, please see Ordinance 2013-6 which is available at the Township municipal office and online at: www.williamstwp.org.

Beginning later this fall, the Township will provide leaf collection services twice a year; once in the fall and once in the spring. The Township will announce on our website the dates that leaf collection services will be available to residents. Residents who would like their leaves collected will need to contact the Township to be added to the collection schedule. Residents will be required to bag their leaves in bio-degradable bags. Bags will be available for purchase at the Township municipal building. Residents will also have the option to drop off their leaves and yard waste at the Township Recycling Center located at 2300 Morgan Hill Road. Additional information regarding the new Burning Ordinance and the recycling mandate is available on the Township website.

Why Stormwater Education is Important

The **Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)** has identified stormwater runoff as one of the most serious problems facing our ability to have a recurring supply of clean drinking water. Polluted storm water runoff is a leading cause of impairment to the nearly 40 percent of U.S. water bodies which do not meet water quality standards. Stormwater is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt. Stormwater travels over land. Sometimes the ground absorbs stormwater, and it never reaches streams, rivers and lakes.

But some storm water traveling over land eventually drains into a system of conveyance devices known collectively as a municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4). This system of conveyance devices includes catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels, pipes, tunnels, or storm drains.

Many daily activities that we take for granted – from washing our cars

to fertilizing our lawns to failing to pick up after our pets – contribute to the pollution that occurs when rain water drains through the MS4 system into our streams and creeks and, eventually, into our rivers and oceans. EPA wants our residents to understand what they can do to help solve the problem.

The EPA requires certain municipalities to address storm water quality. The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection has outlined a program for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4's). In Pennsylvania, Phase I of the program focused on large and medium sized cities above 100,000 population (Philadelphia,

Pittsburgh, and Allentown). New Sewickley is one of about 900 municipalities in Phase II of the program. We are required to educate the public as part of a 5 year permit program.

Back to School

As summer draws to a close and the classroom bell rings in the new school year, 55 million children across the United States will head back to school. With 13 percent of those school children typically walking or biking to school, AAA reminds drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians during before- and after-school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous for walking children – over the last decade, nearly one-third of child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 and 7 p.m.

“More than 1,200 children lost their lives during these after-school hours between 2000 and 2010,” cautioned Jennifer Huebner-Davidson, manager, Traffic Safety Advocacy, “and although we’ve seen a steady decrease in the number of tragedies each year, it’s important to remember that one death is one too many.”

Help Keep Kids Safe

- 1. Respect the big yellow bus.** Imagine being in a large car with 40 noisy 6th-graders. Could be pretty stressful. Do your part and make the bus drivers' lives easier. Yield when they are attempting to merge, and maintain a significant distance behind them, as they often make unexpected stops. Make sure children know to walk in front of - never in back of - buses.
- 2. Slow down.** Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

- 3. Eliminate distractions.** Children often cross the road unexpectedly and may emerge suddenly between two parked cars. Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Put down your cell phone – one text or call could wreck it all.
- 4. Reverse responsibly.** Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing up. Teach your children to never play in, under or around vehicles—even those that are parked.
- 5. Talk to your teen.** Car crashes are the leading cause of death for teens in the United States, and more than one in four fatal crashes involving teen drivers occur during the after-school hours of 3 to 7 p.m. Get evidence-based guidance and tips at TeenDriving.AAA.com.
- 6. Come to a complete stop.** Research shows more than one third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding.
- 7. Watch for bikes.** Children on bikes are often inexperienced, unsteady and unpredictable. Slow down and allow at least three feet of passing distance between your vehicle and the bicycle. If your child rides a bicycle to school, require that they wear a properly-fitted bicycle helmet on every ride. Find videos, expert advice and safety tips at ShareTheRoad.AAA.com

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

The Public Works Dept. will be trimming brush along Township roads this Fall/Winter. We ask that all residents please help us keep our roads safe by trimming and maintaining their trees and shrubbery along their property so the travel lanes of the roadway are not blocked. We are having a lot of problems with hedges, bamboo, and trees hanging into the roadway which is causing a hazard for motorist. This is creating a liability for the property owner and the Township.

The winter season (snow) will be here soon. The Public Works Dept. has almost 70 miles of roads to maintain in the winter time with only seven fulltime employees. It normally takes two – four hours for us to complete one trip around the Township. We ask that residents be patient and only drive during a snow storm if you really need to. (If there is an emergency call (fire, ems, police) plow trucks are pulled off their routes to assist responding emergency vehicles and will delay other roads from being treated.)

There are a couple of things residents need to remember during a snow storm. 1) No vehicles are permitted to be parked on any Township roadway, 2) Do not push or deposit any snow from your driveway out into the roadway. These and other regulations are addressed and enforced by Ordinance # 2002-7.

MOVING PERMITS REMINDER!

Please be aware that Moving Permits are **REQUIRED** in Williams Township if you are moving in, out or within Williams Township. Please contact the Municipal Office if you are going to be moving, the fee is \$5.00 and you may download a form from the Township's website.

THE ECONOMIC BENEFITS OF PRESERVATION

When we think of the many benefits of open space, we usually think of reducing traffic, protecting our water resources, and maintaining our rural character. But sometimes we overlook the economic benefits. The American Farmland Trust's "Cost of Community Services" studies show that the median cost of public services for farmed and undeveloped land is \$.36 for every dollar of revenue brought in, while residential costs \$1.16. It's not surprising that some of our most densely developed neighboring townships also have the highest tax rates. And the cost of preservation is one time, while the benefits last forever.

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

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
