

Restoring Rain's Reputation: What Everyone Can Do To Help

Rain by nature is important for replenishing drinking water supplies, recreation, and healthy wildlife habitats. It only becomes a problem when pollutants from our activities like car maintenance, lawn care, and dog walking are left on the ground for rain to wash away. Here are some of the most important ways to prevent storm water pollution:

-  Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint – never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone who does.
-  Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff.
-  Look for signs of soil and other pollutants, such as debris and chemicals, leaving construction sites in storm water runoff or tracked into roads by construction vehicles. Report poorly managed construction sites that could impact storm water runoff to your community.
-  Install innovative storm water practices on residential property, such as rain barrels or rain gardens, that capture storm water and keep it on site instead of letting it drain away into the storm sewer system.
-  Report any discharges from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather – a sign that there could be a problem with the storm sewer system.



-  Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess – in a backyard or at the park – storm water runoff can carry pet waste from the land to the storm sewer system to a stream.
-  Store materials that could pollute storm water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage that do not rust or leak to eliminate exposure of materials to storm water.



News from the Williams Township Historical Society

The program will focus on rare canal and railroad documents, including maps, relevant to the township and county. Speaker: Ilhan Citak, Archives Curator and Special Collections Librarian at Lehigh University. The public is cordially invited, and donations to the goody table are always welcome.

Fry's Run Park Streambank Restoration Project

In April, workers from the Northampton County Conservation District, Parks Department, Corrections Department and the Fry's Run Watershed Association completed the final phase of the Fry's Run Streambank Restoration Project at Fry's Run County Park (Royal Manor Road and Route 611) by planting 190 trees along 400 linear feet of the creek. The plantings complement the earlier construction phase of the project, which included grading back steeply eroded streambanks and constructing seven streambank stabilization devices, all of which serve to reduce streambank erosion and sediment pollution to Fry's Run and the nearby Delaware River.



The trees will help further stabilize streambank soils along Fry's Run, slow down stormwater runoff, intercept nutrients and other pollutants before they reach the stream, provide wildlife habitat and eventually shade and cool the creek for temperature sensitive fish, like trout. This reach of Fry's Run is designated a Class A Wild Trout Stream.

The Parks Department augered planting holes for the trees, while volunteers from the Corrections Department and the Fry's Run Watershed Association planted the trees. The Conservation District coordinated and managed the project. Funding for the trees was provided by grants from the Coldwater Heritage Partnership, Lehigh Gap Nature Center and the Watershed Coalition of the Lehigh Valley.

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, which designed the project, is drafting plans to repair the stabilization devices that were damaged by runoff from an intense localized rainstorm in June.



Get Ahead of the Winter Freeze

It's not too early to begin preparing for the heating season. Check these 10 tips off your list and get ahead of the winter freeze.

- Our **furnace has been inspected and serviced** by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. *(A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)*
- Our **chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected** by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote build-up. *(Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)*
- Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is **dry, seasoned wood**.
- Our **fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass**, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- We have a **covered metal container** ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. *(The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)*
- Our children know to stay at least **3 feet away** from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.
- Our portable space heaters have an **automatic shut-off**.
- Our portable space heaters will be **plugged directly into an outlet** *(not an extension cord)* and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. *(Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn-off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.)*
- We have **tested our smoke alarms** and made sure they are working. *(You need a smoke alarm on every level of the home, inside each bedroom and outside each sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)*
- We have **tested our carbon monoxide alarms** and made sure they are working. *(Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)*

Recycling

Brush & Leaf Recycling

Bins are available for Williams Township residents to drop off their brush and leaves at the Williams Township Recycling Center on Morgan Hill Road. The center is open spring through fall on the first & third Saturdays of each month from 8am to 12pm. PLEASE do not put anything other than leaves in the leaf bin and brush in the brush bin. (No grass clippings or plastic bags. These items will ruin the load and we will be unable to recycle the materials.)



Items Accepted:

- Leaves - loose and in brown paper bags
- Small brush - up to 4" in diameter (no longer than 6 ft.)
- Hedge trimmings and garden plant residue

Items NOT Accepted:

- Grass
- Sod
- Tree stumps
- Commercial business materials

OPEN BURNING BAN REMINDER

The Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance 2013-06 on September 11, 2013 providing for the regulation of outdoor burning, prescribing penalties for violations, and repealing all prior ordinances. The Board of Supervisors has determined that air pollution from Open Burning may be detrimental to the health, comfort, living conditions, welfare, and safety of the citizens of Williams Township. And is



hereby declared to be the policy of Williams Township to safeguard the citizens of the Township from air pollution. Williams Township provides curbside leaf collection twice a year and there is a bin provided to our residents to drop off your leaves & brush at the Williams Township Recycling Center located at 2300 Morgan Hill Road on the first and third Saturday of every month from 8am to 12pm.
